A bobcat family was spotted by Wren Grigore in the backyard of their Florida home on October 18th. The observation was classified as research grade, contributing valuable data to our understanding of local wildlife. Bobcats (*Lynx rufus*) are solitary and elusive predators, known for their tufted ears and short, bobbed tails. They are highly adaptable, thriving in a variety of habitats, from forests to suburban areas. Bobcats typically avoid human interaction.
