A Florida Stone Crab was spotted by Alex Kissel along the Florida coast on November 5th. The observation was classified as research grade, contributing valuable data to our understanding of local wildlife. Florida stone crabs (Menippe mercenaria) are resilient crustaceans known for their strong, oversized claws. They thrive in a variety of coastal habitats. Stone crabs play an important role in maintaining healthy marine ecosystems by feeding on small shellfish and algae.
